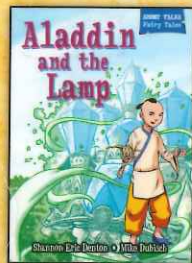


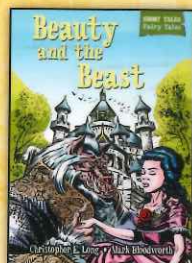

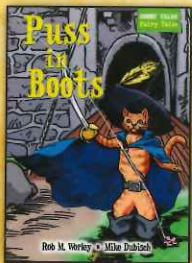

Then, the magician took Aladdin to see some beautiful gardens.

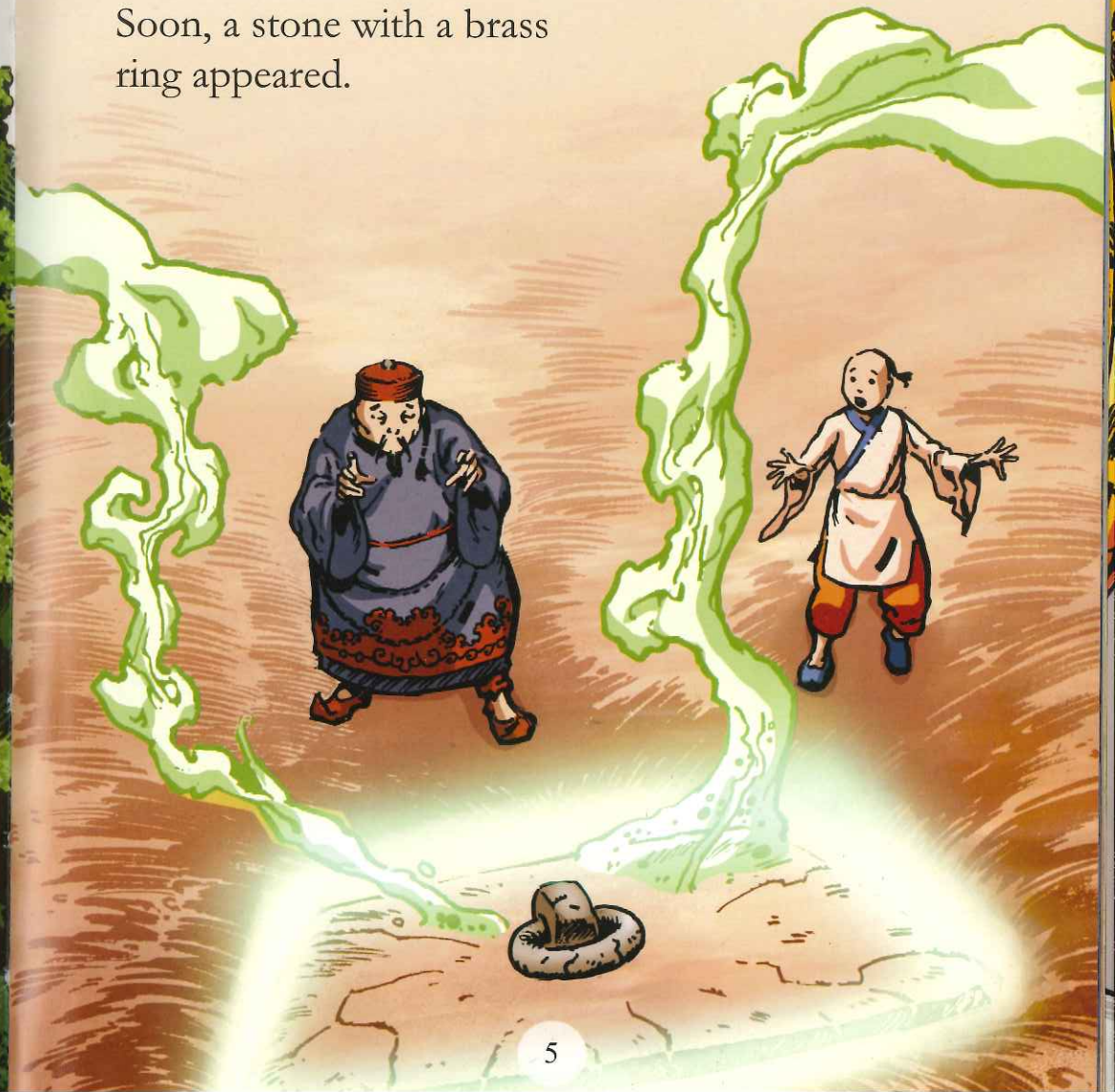


They walked until they had almost reached the mountains.

into a cave and get a lamp.

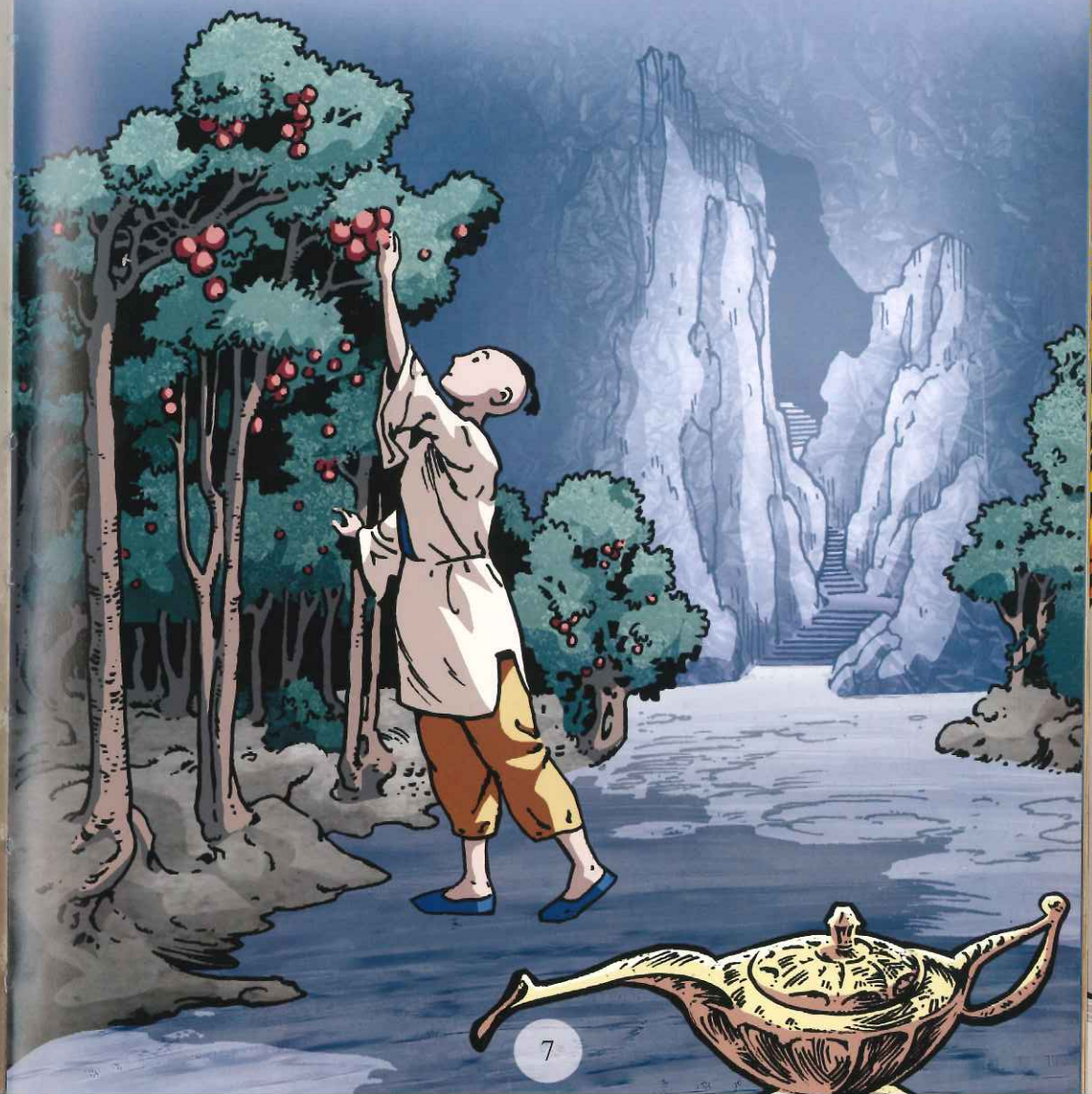
He gave Aladdin a ring and wished him luck.

This made the magician very angry.

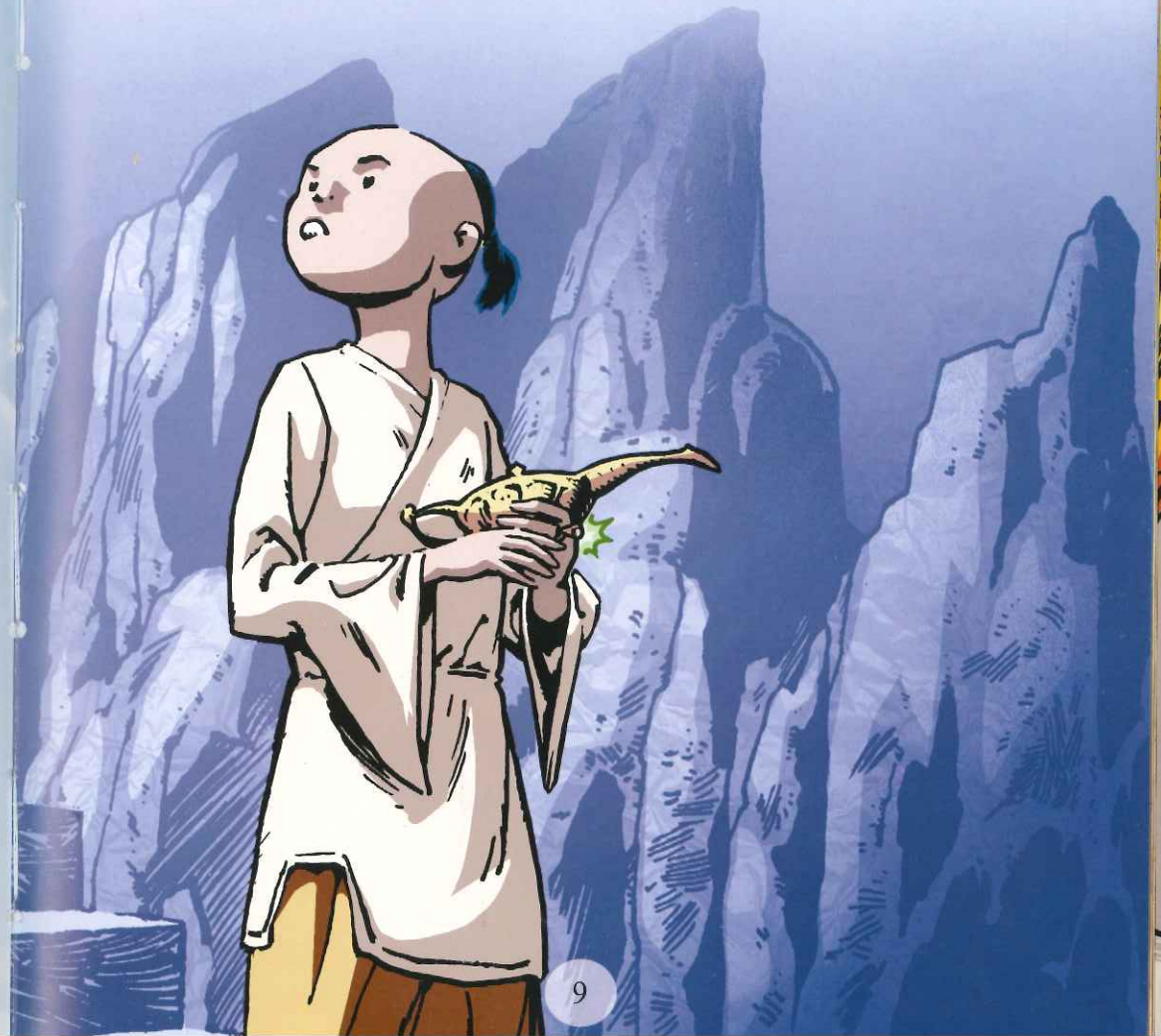
He shouted some magic words and the cave door sealed.

He realized he had been tricked.

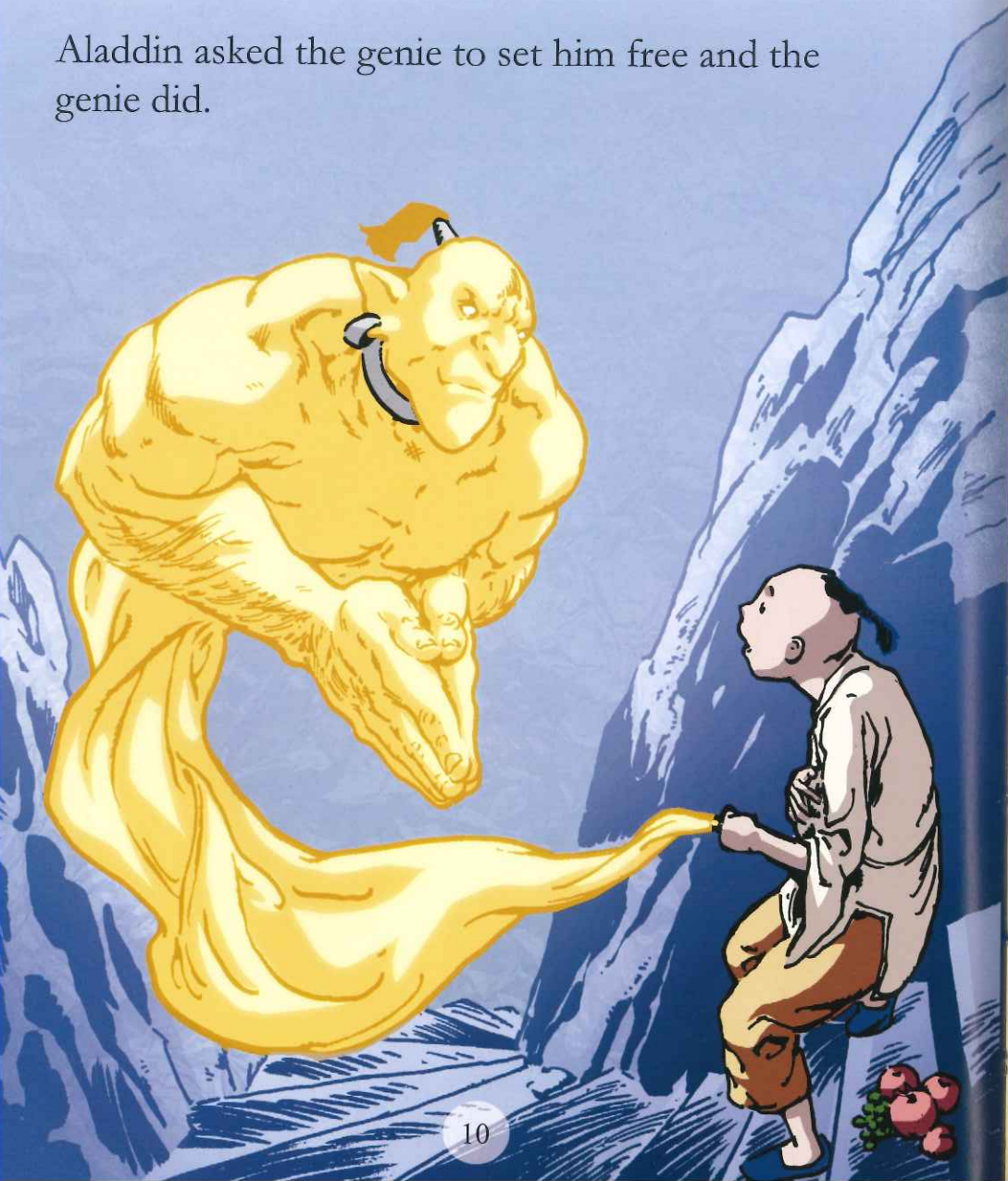
He wiped his hand and accidentally rubbed the ring.

Aladdin asked the genie to set him free and the genie did.

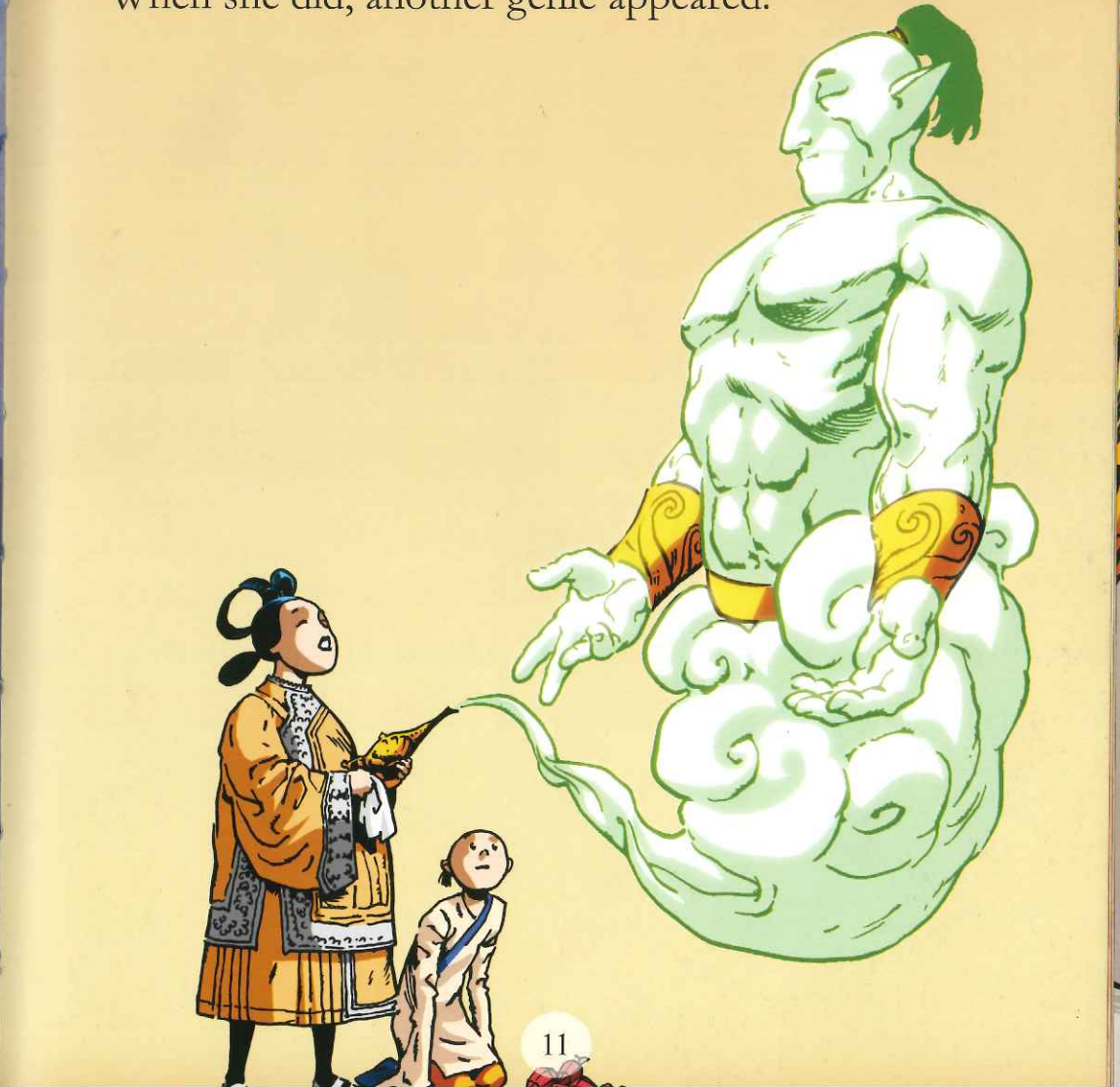


Aladdin ran home and told his mother everything.

When she did, another genie appeared.



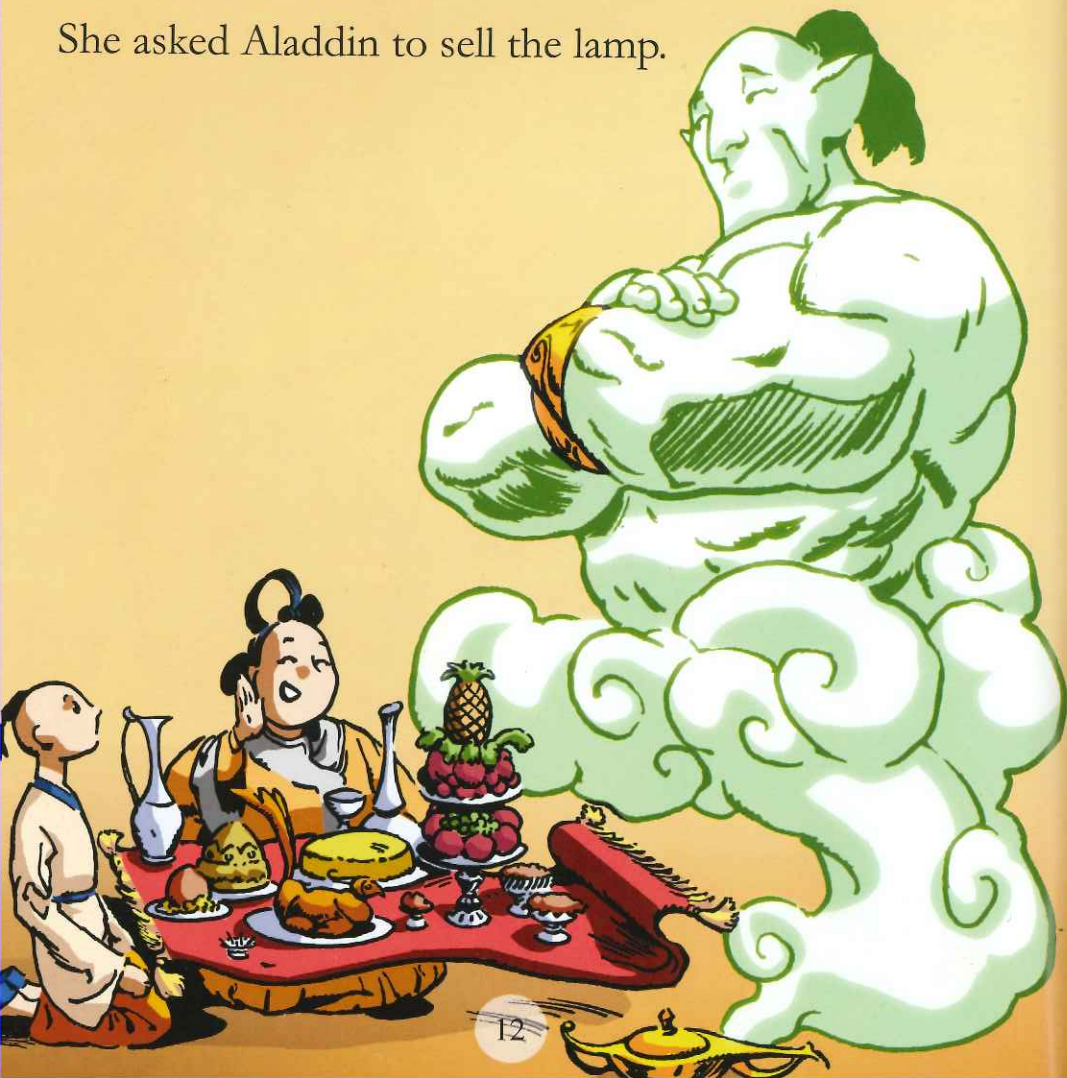
Aladdin asked the genie to get them something to eat.

But she wasn't happy about having a genie in the house.

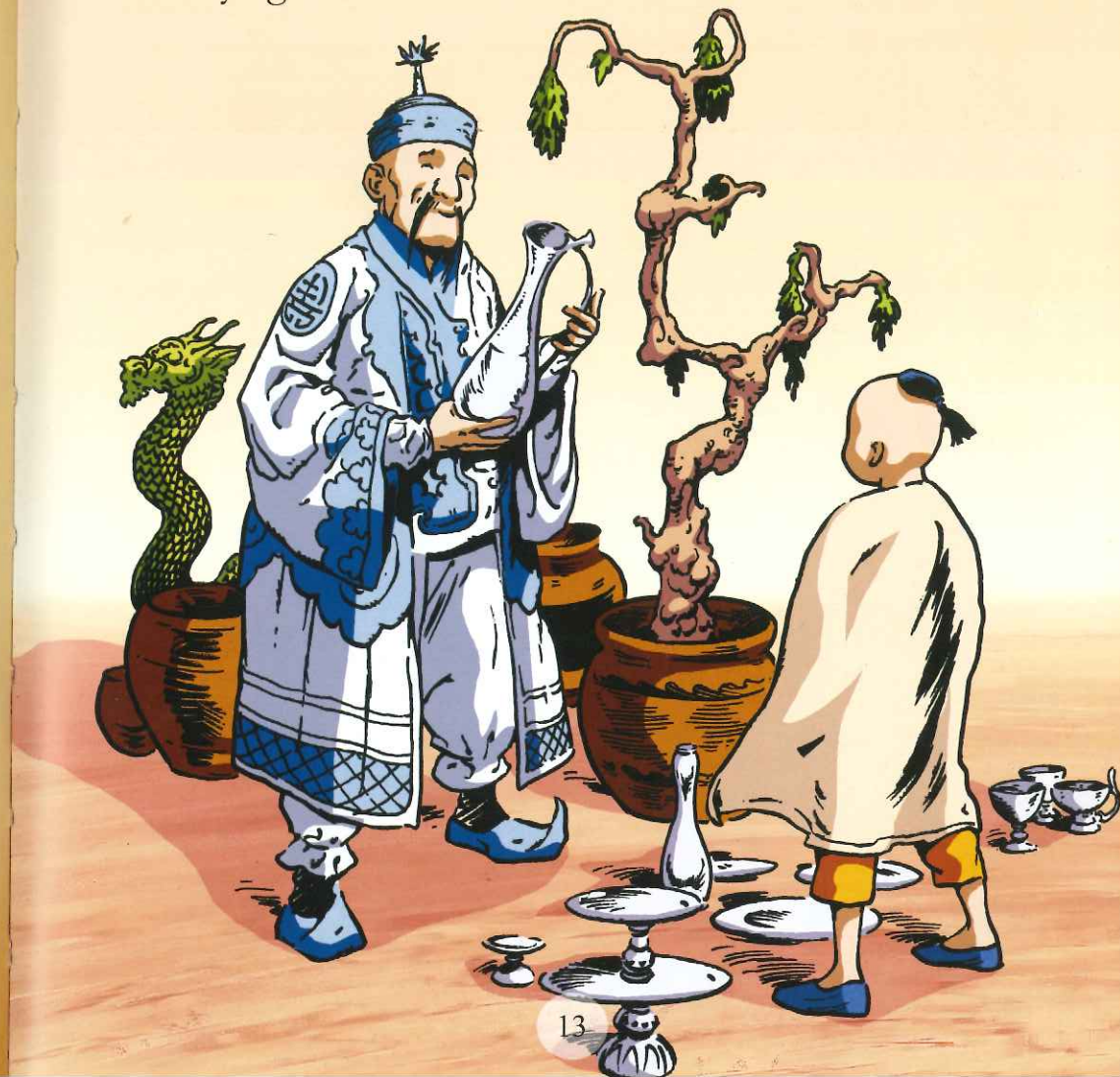
She asked Aladdin to sell the lamp.

There was more silver with every meal the genie brought them.

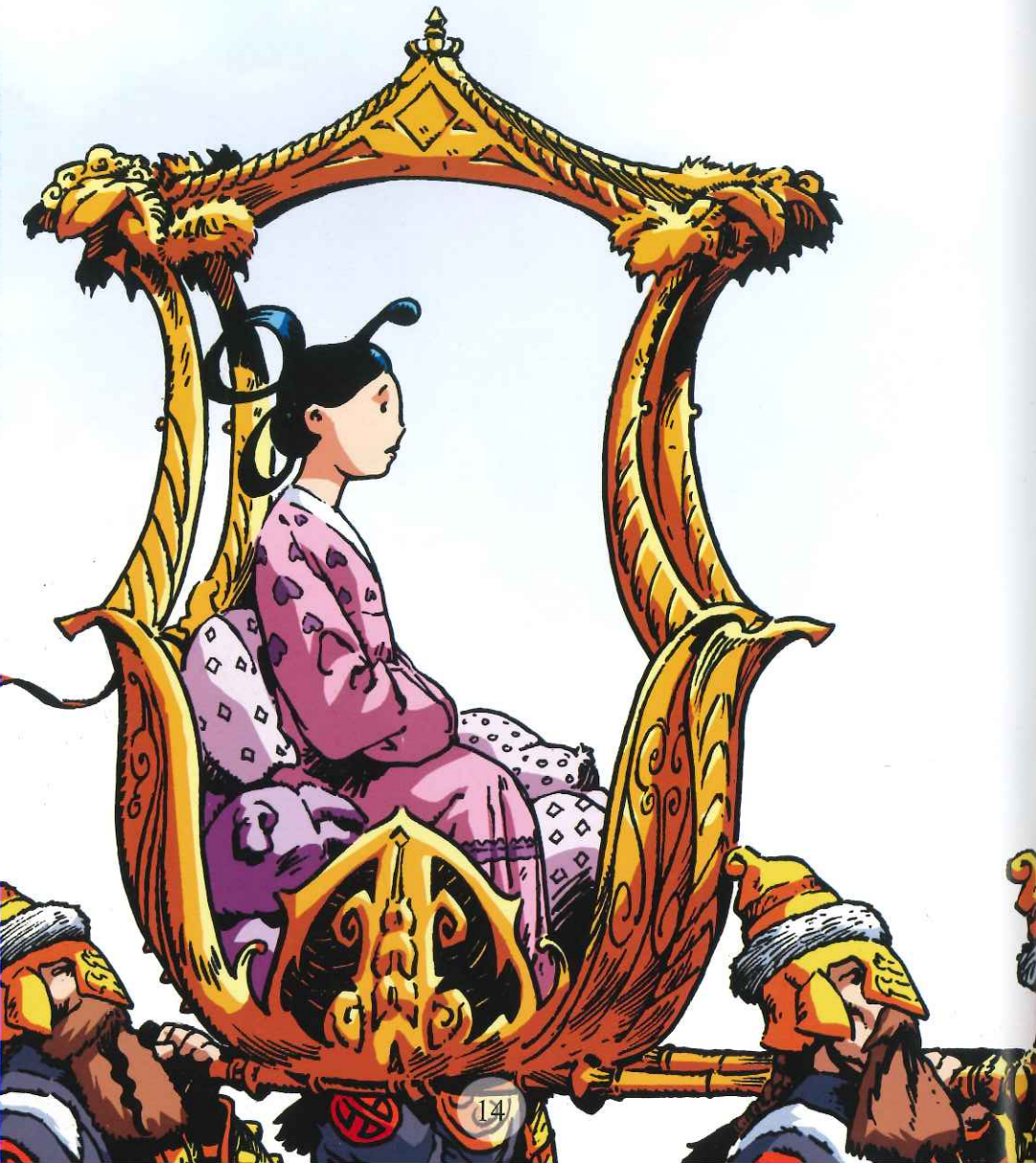
Aladdin and his mother did not have to worry about money again.

The Sultan said, 'In three months I will decide who will marry my daughter.'

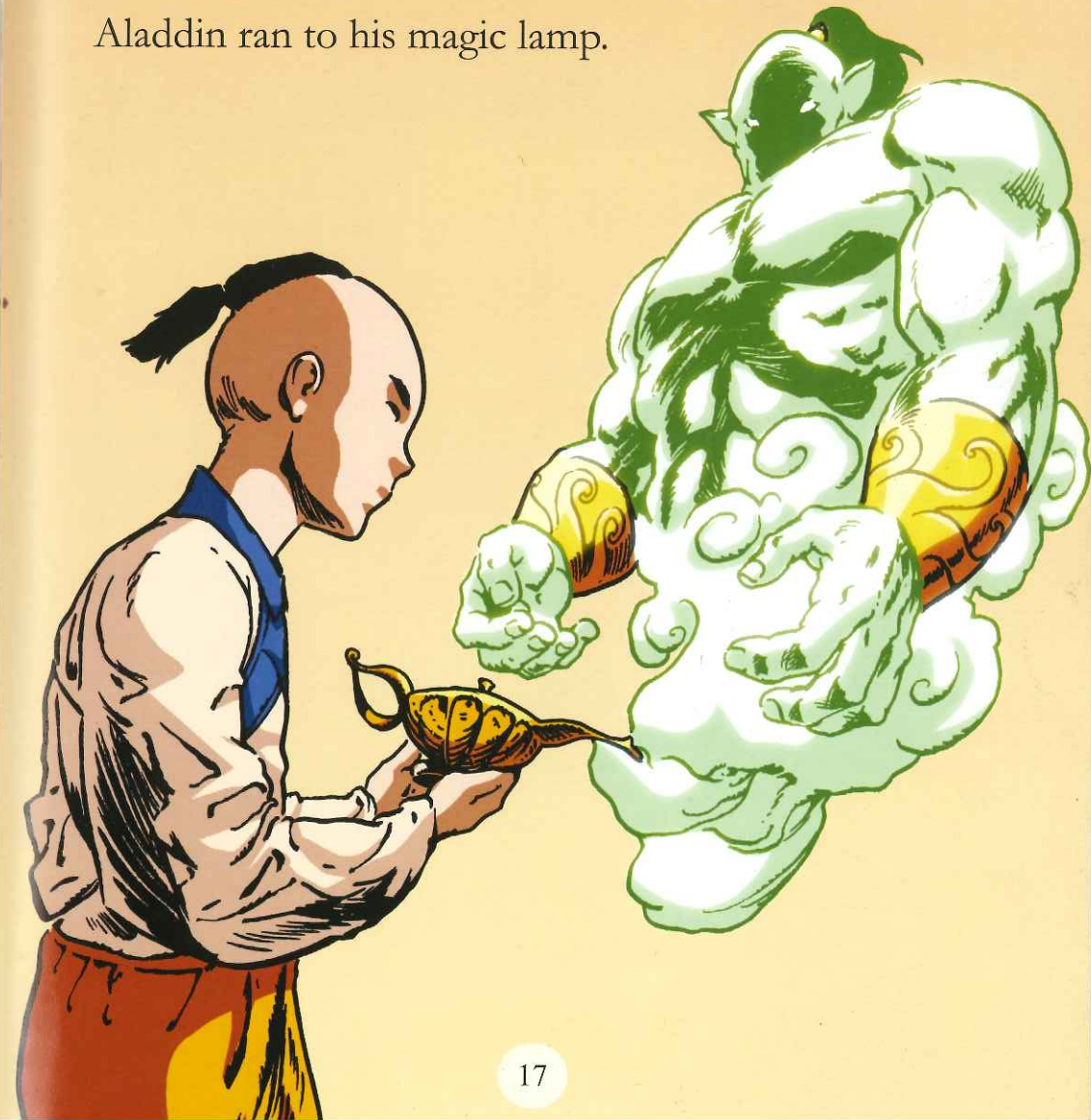


During the second month, Aladdin's mother heard news at the market.

The Sultan decided to give Aladdin one more test.

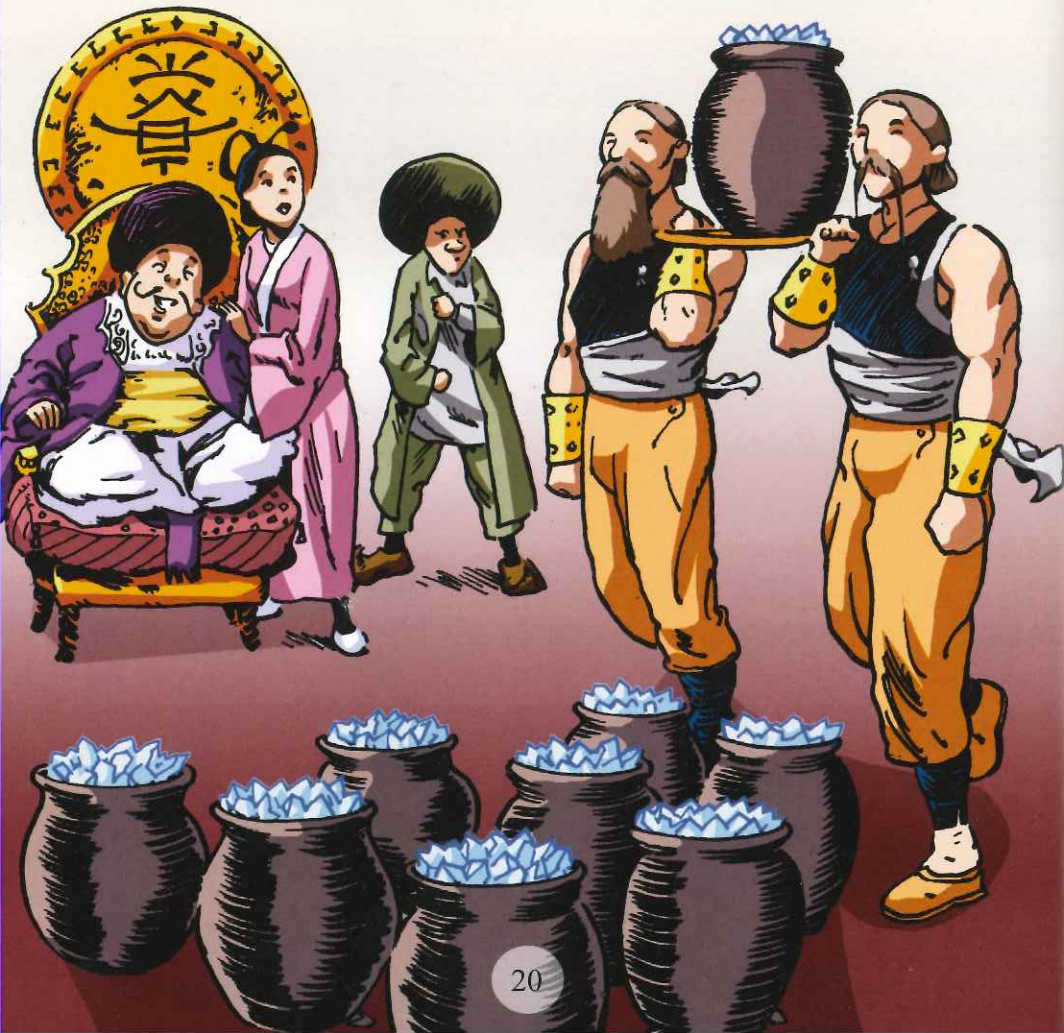
The Sultan said, 'Your son must send me forty baskets full of jewels. They must be carried by eighty attendants. Then he may marry my daughter.'

Aladdin rode towards the palace.

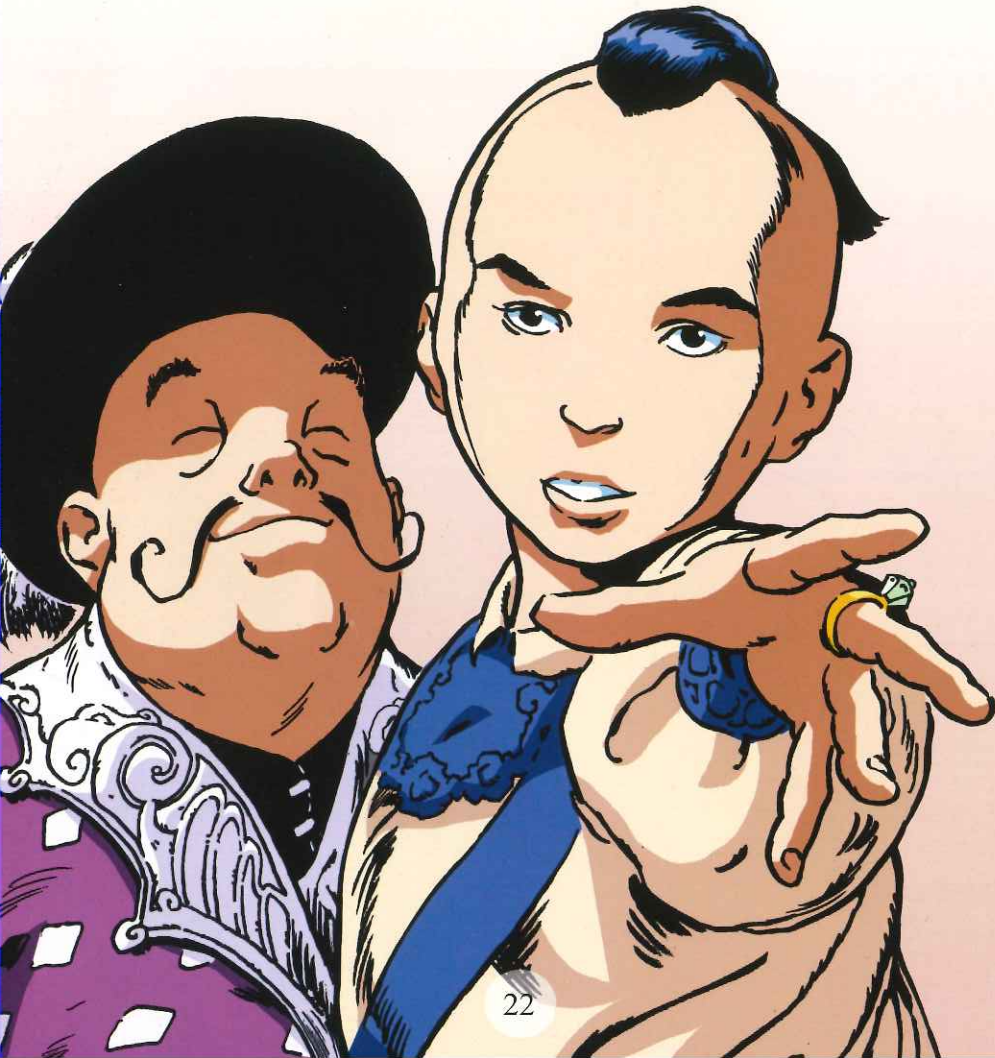
Along the way, his attendants gave out gold.



When the Sultan saw him, he said Aladdin would marry the princess that very day.

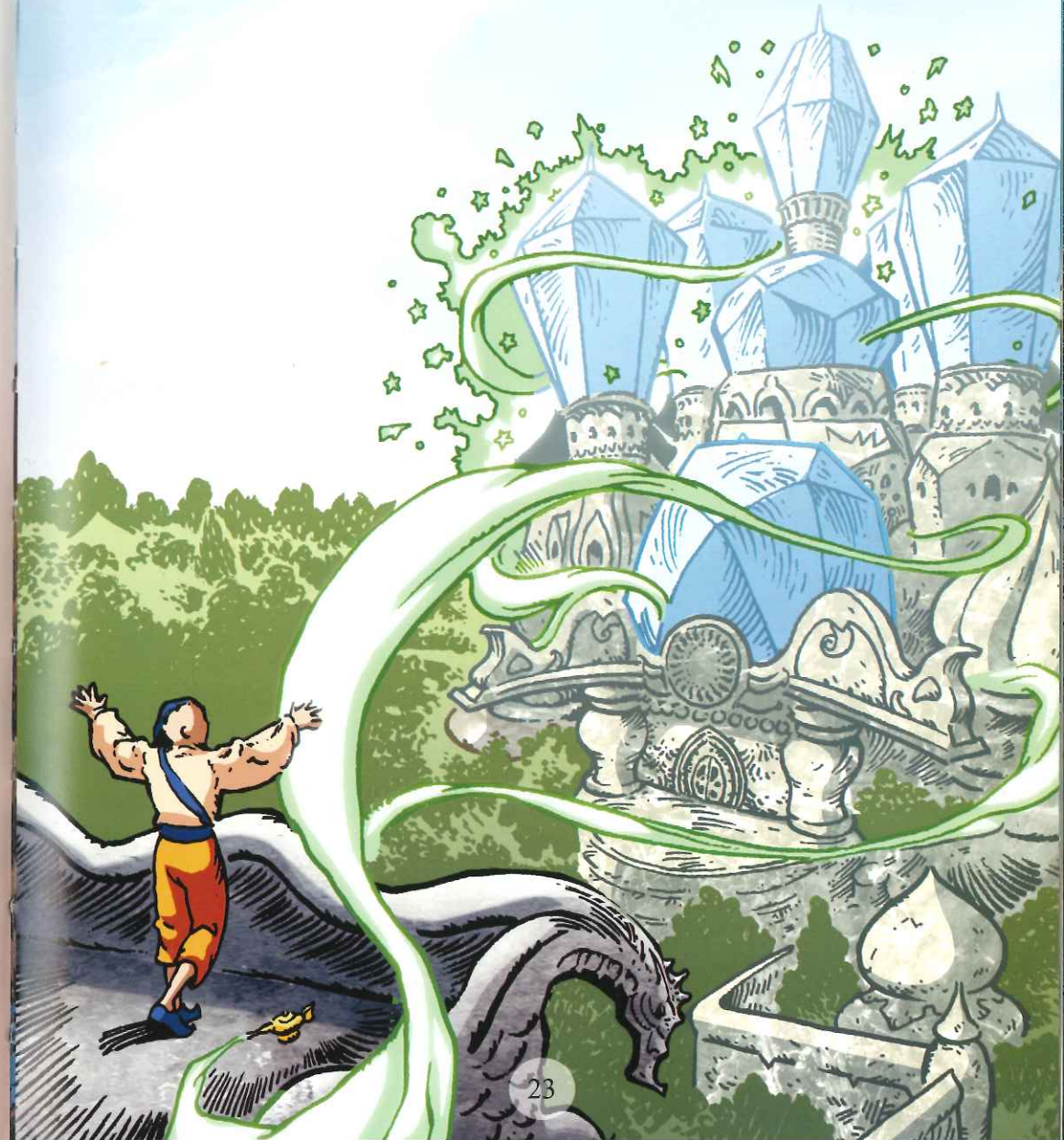
Aladdin told the Sultan he wanted to build the princess a palace first.

Soon, the princess and Aladdin were home again!



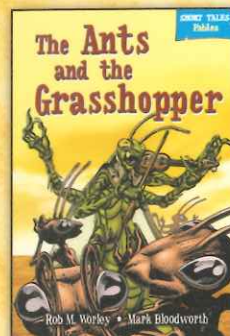
They lived the rest of their lives in peace.
